





What is a Poem?

A poem is a piece of writing that uses imaginative words to share ideas and emotions with the reader using techniques such as repetition, simile or personification.

The format of a poem could be:

- Separated into verses
- One single verse
- A poetic form such as an acrostic, riddle or kennings poem

Does a poem have to rhyme? NO! You can use rhyme if you want to, but you don't have to!



What Can I Write About?

Your teacher may give you a subject and/or poetic style to write in.

If not, now is the time to think up an idea to write about, here are some suggestions to help you:

- Pick a nature or environment-themed word to write an acrostic
- Be inspired by your favourite animal, plant or green space
- Write 4 x haikus about seasons/weather
- Use 'Our Planet' as a title

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What is Personification?

Personification is a long word that simply means making an object or idea do something only a human can do!

E.g.

An ocean might say: Plastic swims through me, making me cry

What would an animal, or a tree, say if they were talking to us?

Write down any ideas for your poem in box 3 on your planning sheet.

What is a Metaphor?

It is where you describe something as something else...

- Choose a noun from one of your lines to change to a metaphor.

Think of words that describe your noun:
E.g. If you had the word 'river'
You might write 'long, cool, watery, clear'

- Now think of other things that share the same description E.g. Ribbon, ice, liquid, glass

- Use these new items to describe your noun E.g. Ribbons of liquid glass flow through me

What is Alliteration?

It's where you use the same letter or sound at the beginning of words:

E.g. Using river as our word again, if you said 'fish swim in me' You could use alliteration to change the line to 'My waves are filled full of flitting fish'

What words with the same letter or sound can you think of to describe your theme? Pop your ideas in box 3 on your planning sheet.

What is Imagery?

Imagery is how you describe your subject so the reader can imagine what you're doing or seeing.

- You can create imagery by using your senses – what can you (or your poem subject) see, feel, hear, smell, taste?

- Who or what is nearby?
- How does this make you (or your poem's subject) feel?
- What descriptive words can you use?
- What poetic techniques can you include?
